

Directions for Differentiated Problems

Elapsed Time

- Step I: Print I copy of each page and cut apart problems
- Step 2: Stuff eggs every egg gets one problem. Each level gets a different color. Example: low level (blue eggs), on level (purple eggs), above level (yellow eggs)
- Step 3: Hide eggs in classroom, around school, on playground, etc. (You could even let the kids hide them!)
- Step 4: Print differentiated recording sheet (the option that says "Egg Color"). You'll assign students to a specific egg color that matches their learning level

Step 5: Let the student engagement skyrocket!

- B Medium
- C Difficult

Suggestions for Implementation

- If you hide eggs around school, make sure adults are available to monitor students.
- Clipboards are a great way to help kids stay organized while hunting for eggs!
- Once students open the egg and copy down the problem on their recording sheet, have students put the problem back in the egg and lay the egg in the same place they found it.
- Do not let students move eggs. It will cause confusion for students to know which problems they've already done.
- Differentiated: Once students solve their assigned colored eggs, let them hunt for another color (Have additional recording sheets available or copy it front to back)
- Have the students collect all of the eggs at the end and count to make sure you have all that you started with
- Can be partner work or an independent task. If independent, remind students that there should only be one student at each egg.
